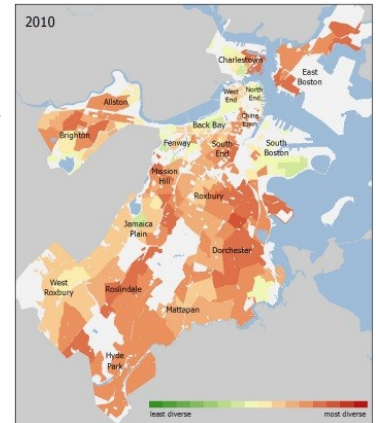




Visualizing Immigration: Teaching with Primary Sources, Maps & Data

Course Description:

In collaboration with the National Archives in Waltham, MA and the Massachusetts Historical Society, this workshop for educators will focus on teaching this complex topic with a variety of primary sources and data that can be used to foster critical thinking with students at various grade levels. Sources will include maps, political cartoons, photographs, documents and immigration data. Participants will learn from scholars, educators, and one another, various strategies for using these resources effectively with students to understand both our national and local immigration history.
