Norman B. Leventhal Map Center at the Boston Public Library Announces Year-Long Exhibition Exploring America's Westward Expansion

Part I of "America Transformed" opens May 4

Boston, MA – The Norman B. Leventhal Map & Education Center announced today the opening of its new exhibition *America Transformed: Mapping the 19th Century*, a year-long showcase that delves into the intricacies of the time period through cartographic pieces. The exhibition explores the United States' westward legacy and the drastic alterations to both the land and culture. Visitors are invited to explore the immense collection of historical maps and interactive displays that depict the different narratives from the century.

"With this new exhibition, people can dive into the transformation of America's 19th-century landscape and challenge themselves to examine how that transformation continues to shape our lives today," said Ron Grim, Curator at the Leventhal Map Center. "The way our landscape has changed, both physically and culturally, is striking. The installation challenges us with different accounts of the United States' westward expansion, and it is my hope that visitors come away with a better understanding of the complexity of our nation's history."

"This is a unique way to learn about westward expansion and its impacts," said Connie Chin, President of the Norman B. Leventhal Map & Education Center at the Boston Public Library. "With our many maps and images from the time period itself, visitors can cartographically view and explore the substantial shifts that have led America to where it is now. We hope that people will learn more about the 19th century as they explore it through a unique medium."

"The Boston Public Library is thrilled to see this new exhibition from the Leventhal Map and Education Center. We share a mission to bring moments from history alive and to examine how they fit into today's discourse, and we look forward to seeing how this exhibition informs current events and issues," said Boston Public Library President David Leonard.

Announced earlier this year, <u>Iron Mountain Incorporated</u>TM (NYSE: IRM), the global leader in storage and information management services, presented Leventhal Map & Education Center with a financial grant for the showcase, and delivered transport and specialized temporary storage services for exhibition items via an existing relationship with Crozier Fine Arts, the company's art storage and logistics provider. The exhibition will open in two separate 6-month exhibitions, with the first half of the exhibition, "The U.S. Expands Westward," details the beginning of America's westward legacy and the transformation that the country experienced. The second half of the exhibit will open later this year.

America Transformed features over 125 objects that depict the changes to land, economy, transportation and people within the United States in the 19th century. Visitors will learn how the advancement of one theme depended on the others, beginning with the settlement of western land that displaced native peoples. As new settlers occupied these lands, the country's economy diversified through coal and iron mining as well as plantation agriculture, all of which were impacted in the 1850's by the rise of industrialization. The exhibition will also illustrate the construction of roads, canals, steamboats and railroads that allowed for the vast expansion westward to occur. Through each of these events, the population demographics experienced substantial changes in growth, diversity, and density due to immigration and the desire to purchase lands in the west.

Individuals can engage with selected maps from the collection through an interactive format, "Zooming in on History" both within the showcase and online. The format includes a few visualization tools that allows people to compare maps from the 1800's to present day. A virtual version of the exhibition will be available on the Leventhal Map & Education Center's website, with full catalog information, photographs of the gallery, and even educational activities created for the exhibition.

A formal Family Day opening for the exhibition will occur on May 18, 1-4 p.m. and will include a talk from Curator Ron Grim, additional speakers, hands-on activities for students and kids, interactive tech demonstrations, and tours of the exhibit and the gallery.
